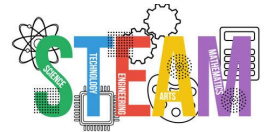
1st place Harlan Eckard, 2nd place Grayson Wiederholt, and 3rd place Trevor Strough.

challenges them to think about the choices they make and how those choices impact their own lives and the lives of those around them."

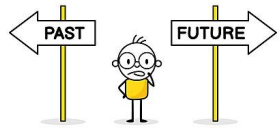

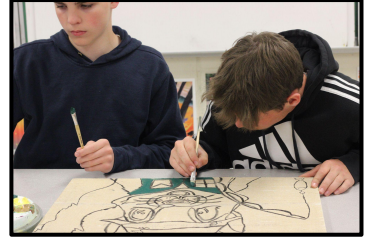
