Bulldog Sports History: Wrestling

This month we will be looking back on the history of Stanberry wrestling. There have been many accomplishments in our wrestling program with many more to come in the upcoming years.

The first season of wrestling in Stanberry was in 1976, and since then many wrestlers have medaled at state. Beginning in 1984-85 Jeff Redmond took 5th in the heavyweight category; 1992-93 Brad Gage took 4th at 189; 2005-06 Trevor Stoll took 3rd at 125 and Patrick Jennings took 3rd at 189; 2006-07 Trevor Stoll took 2nd at 130; 2008-09 Brett Smill took 6th at 145; 2009-10 Bryar Ginther took 5th at 112, Conner Rosier took 5th at 189, and Andy Luke took 5th at 171; 2010-11 Devin Gage took 4th at 145; 2011-12 Brian Noble took 3rd at 113 and Jesse Oldham took 5th at 132; 2012-13 Jesse Oldham placed again at 3rd at 132; 2013-14 Trenton Stoll took 6th at 132; 2014-15 Mason Rosier took 5th at 170; 2015-16 Elory Anderson took 5th at heavyweight; and

most recently last year Austin Colvin took 4th at heavyweight. Through all of these years only one person from Stanberry has taken 1st and that was Nick Eiberger in 1997 wrestling in the 189 weight class.

Throughout the years there has been a total of five coaches: Chuck McCintosh from 1976-1979, Greg Dias from 1979-1992, Dan Collins from 1992-2002, Laverne Smithson from 2002-2011, and Jason Dias from 2011-Present.

Another thing has also changed within the wrestling program; female wrestlers now only wrestle other females. They have whole separate tournaments and during meets they will only wrestle if there is another woman at the same weight class. They also have separate district and state tournaments for the female division. We wish Coach Dias and his wrestlers great success in the upcoming seasons, and maybe one year he can bring a wrestler to a first place win at state again.

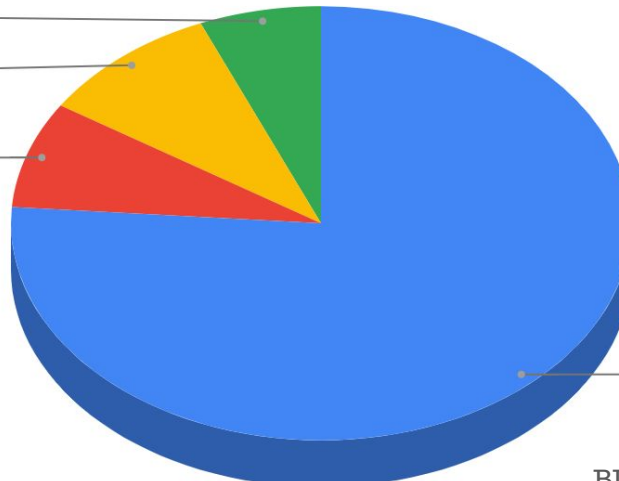

Song Review

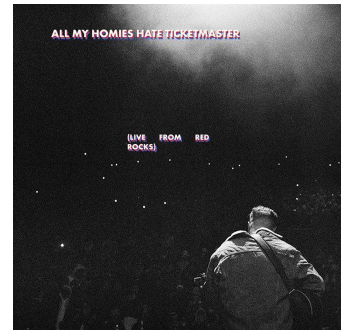

costs about \$12.50. They spend about \$1,200 a year on fast food; the average American spends about 10% of their income on fast food.

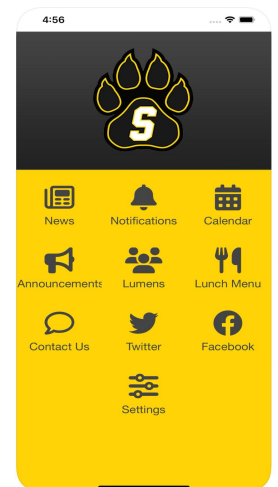

one of a few stories indicating the beginning of Valentine's Day.

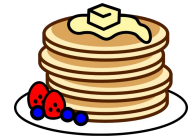

Step 1: Purchase your favorite pancake mix. Hungry Jack pancakes are a good way to go.

Step 2: Depending on how many you want to make, it takes a certain amount of mixture. For 6-8 pancakes, mix 1 cup of mixture and $\frac{3}{4}$ cup water. For 12-16 pancakes you use 2 cups of mix and $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of water.

(You can add extra things in your pancake mixture like chocolate chips or blueberries if you want some extra flavor.)

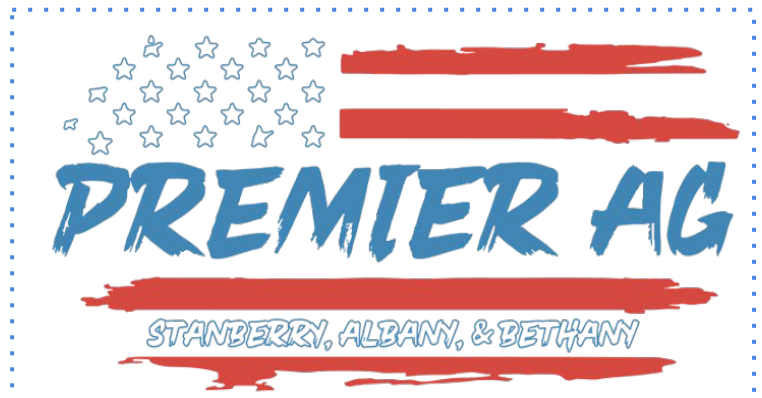
Step 3: Heat your skillet over medium high heat and cook them until both sides are golden and fluffy (it won't take very long at all).

After you have all of your pancakes made, you can add toppings like different syrups or peanut butter. I always add peanut butter on mine; it makes them 10x better.

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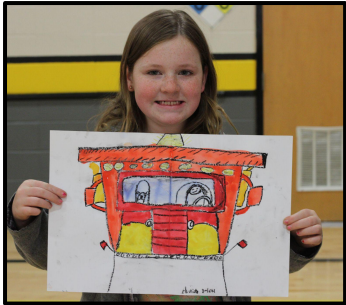

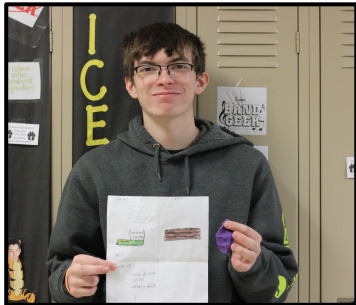
