Students in grades 7-12 were asked the question: *What is your favorite genre of music?* 52 students responded.

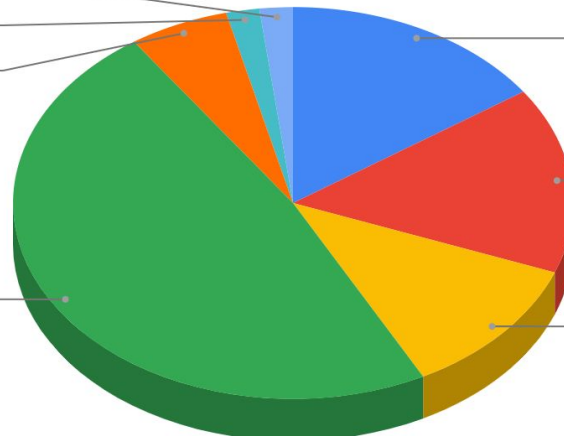

Song Review

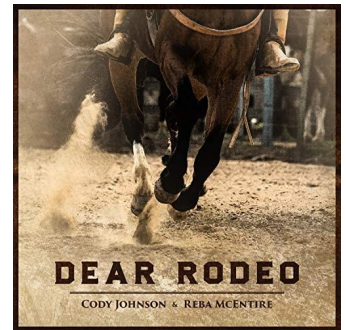

I recommend not only this song but every other song by Cody Johnson.

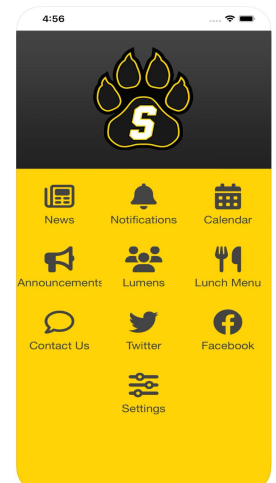

In the beginning, it was a bit of a struggle with the

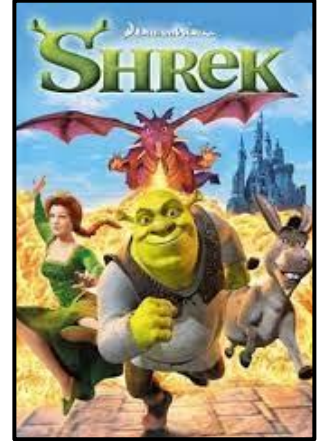

Step 3: Grab your nacho cheese and heat it up in either the oven or microwave until hot; no one wants cold cheese for their nachos.

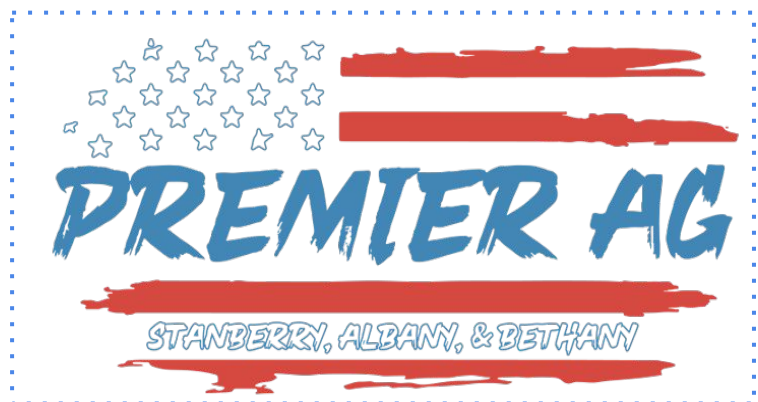
Step 4: This food is made for everyone to make their own plate so everybody can have the preferred amount of everything they want.

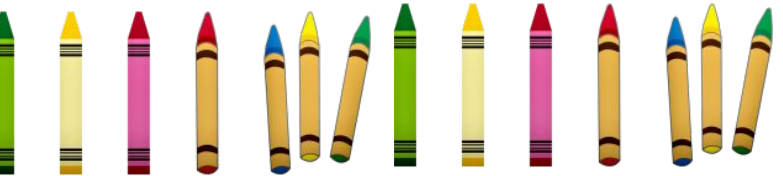
Artist of the Month

This month's artist of the month focuses mainly on the elementary, beginning with first grader Emily Luke. The first graders learned about face proportions and were given options on each facial feature to try, some chose closed eyes, a pointed nose, or wide open smile. Proportions were discussed so the eyes were between each ear, the nose below the eyes and in the middle, and the mouth below the nose. The size of the neck was measured with the student's hand width, and a coat and scarf were added...though the head was left open. What did all of this amount to? Well, how else do you show that it is windy in a portrait? Emily Luke used a straw and blew liquid watercolor where her hair should be. Many students became enthusiastic with the blowing of paint, so many breaks were taken. Emily said her favorite part about this project was painting the background.

Up next is second grader Maia Weaver Fletcher. Penguins are not a new subject matter for these second graders, but making one that is realistic by using a new medium such as chalk and charcoal is something new. Looking at Maia's artwork, you cannot even tell how difficult it can be to keep black charcoal off the white chalk while blending them at the edges. Maia took care to carefully draw and blend her penguin, as well as her background. It was hard to get the artwork away from her each day after class! Mia said her favorite part of the project was drawing the penguin.

Isabella Rippetto's new project for fourth graders looks at artist Jen Aranyi who uses pen and watercolor for her landscapes. Students looked at her miniature works and talked about the foreground, middle ground, background, and horizon line of the mountain landscapes she is fond of creating. Students were able to



decide how they wanted to create their scene, shading was created with hatching lines for the shadows in the mountains. The most fun for Bella was creating the watercolor sky on wet paper and then having the teacher apply salt, the reaction this created wasn't fully viewed until the following class period when students scraped it off. Isabella's favorite part of this project was using watercolors to paint the sky.

Finally, we have fifth grader Quincy Cameron's close-up dragon eyes with bright oil pastels and watercolor paints that were created by first focusing on the pupil of their imagined dragons. Examples were given to generate ideas for the students' own eyes. The way she thickened the lines around the pupil and iris exaggerated it so it doesn't get lost in all the scales. Her color scheme also lends to the visually pleasing piece of artwork; you can tell

she was intentional with her paints. Quincy said her favorite part of this project was coloring everything in at the end.

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Bulldog Sports History: Basketball

For this month we'll be looking into the history of boys' and girls' basketball here at Stanberry. Starting off with boys' basketball the earliest record of the boys' team we could find in past yearbooks is 1929, and since then we have had quite a few accomplishments starting in 1971 as state champions. The second decade of the 2000s had the Bulldogs headed to state back to back in 2013, finishing in 2nd place, and 2014 in 3rd place. 2016 was the year of the Gauntlet when the boy's basketball and football teams walked away as state champions. Our most recent run at the state championship was last year in 2022 where we walked away with 2nd place. On top of our state accolades the Bulldog boys were district champs in the years 1980, 1981, 1988, 1989, 1990, 2091, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2021, 2022. Our current head hoach Mr. Groomer was head coach for all but one of those state runs, so naturally we had to know what he felt about all the success he's had. He stated, "I have taken four teams to the state final four. All four teams were different in their own way and each has a special place in my heart. I was so proud of these teams to go down to state and represent our community and school. It was an honor, and I

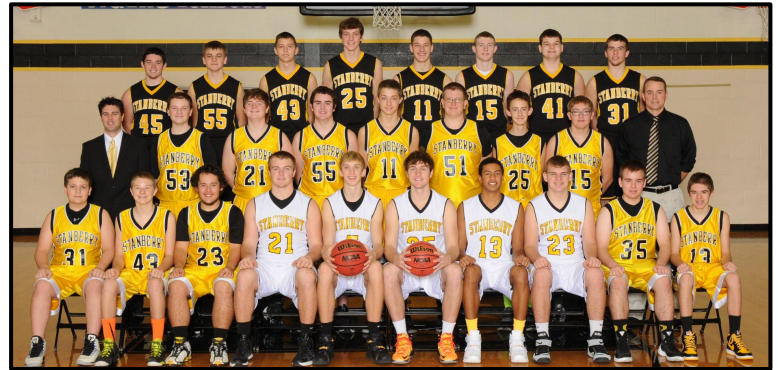
will never forget the many memories I have from those trips." Fans look forward to seeing the future success of the boys' basketball teams in Stanberry.

Now to the girls' teams. The first girls' basketball team debuted in 1973-1974, which was 45 years after the boys' played their first game in 1929. The Lady Bulldogs have had their fair share of success over the years as district champs in 1986, 1996, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2010, 2019, 2019, 2021. Their first state qualifier team was in the year 2019 in which they walked away as second in the state. Karla McQueen was head coach when the girls made it to state and she commented, "I have several fond memories while coaching Stanberry girls' Basketball. The year we played in the state tournament was definitely one of them. I was blessed with a great group of girls, a supportive administration, and an awesome assistant, coach Kelli Hilton. The 2019 State Runner-Up team contributed to the strong tradition of Stanberry Basketball. #soproud"

Overall, basketball in Stanberry has seen great success, and we hope we can continue the success into the future.
