

The band played "Lest We Forget", while the Student Council presented the "Americas White Table" ceremony. NHS presented flags of each branch of the military

whilst the choir sang "Armed Forces." The FFA National Convention was held in November in Indianapolis, Indiana. The group of FFA members stopped in St. Louis and did some shopping and even got the chance to travel to the top of the arch. They arrived at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis where they did some shopping while waiting for the convention to begin. The opening ceremony kicked off with a dance party as national officers welcomed everyone that came, there were many motivational speeches, as well as a performance of the state FFA band and choir. Late into the season of November the football boys had their final game in district play, which ended their season. And with the end of football season comes the rise of the high school basketball season. **December** showcased many events such as the Elementary Christmas Concert this year's theme was "A Pirate Christmas". Grades K-5 sang christmas carols and the 6th

Upon being asked his thoughts on finishing his high school music career, Drum Major Brayden Hague responded with, "I appreciated








