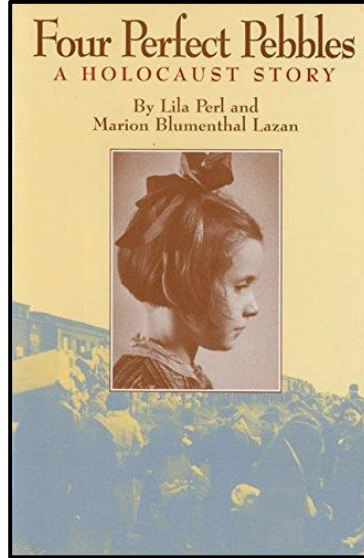

eventually moved to a different camp called Bergen-Belsen, also the same camp as Anne Frank was moved to. Towards the end of the war her family was put on the "Death Train" and sent across Germany while the Nazis tried to kill as many of them as they could. Her family survived the "Death Train" and were liberated by the Russians, but her father passed away from typhus 2 months later.

In the late 1940s Marion and her family were able to move to the U.S., and she was able to go to school in Illinois, where she met her husband.

She has spoken to thousands of people about her story, and the whole point of her telling the story was to get people to understand that what happened was wrong, and she hopes people will forgive each other and get along. ## Students Hear First Hand from Holocaust Survivor

On Tuesday, November 8th at 2:00 Mrs. Marion Blumenthal Lazan, a Holocaust survivor, did a Zoom call with junior high and high school students to discuss her experience during the Holocaust. Students from King City High School and South Nodaway also joined in on the call so they could also hear her story.

Marion was captured and forced into the

Westerbork and Bergen-Belsen concentration camp at the age of 9. She was put on the "Death Train" at the end of the war and managed to survive. Marion has written a book about her journey called *Four Perfect Pebbles: A True Story of the Holocaust*. This book is easy to read and very informative. The book is also available in different languages.

Marion talked about forgiveness and emphasized

students to get along. She strongly wants to encourage people to be empathetic towards others, listen, and be accepting towards each other's differences. She does not want history to repeat itself.

Before the start of the war, Marion and her family secured a pass to the United States, but unfortunately the visa did not come before they were captured and put into a concentration camp at Westerbork. They were

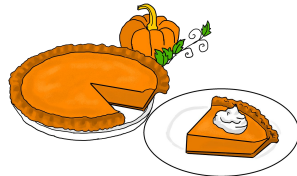

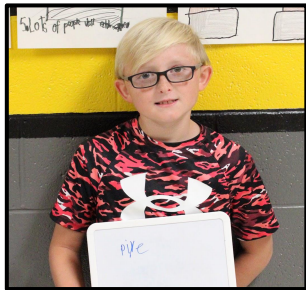

Their options included spending time with family, no school, traveling, or having many Thanksgiving dinners.

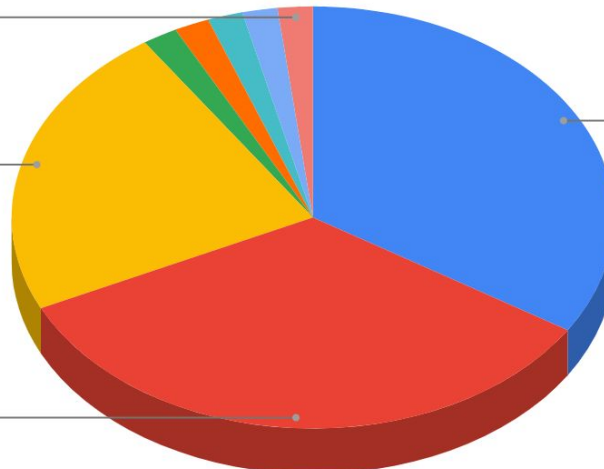

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## Song Review



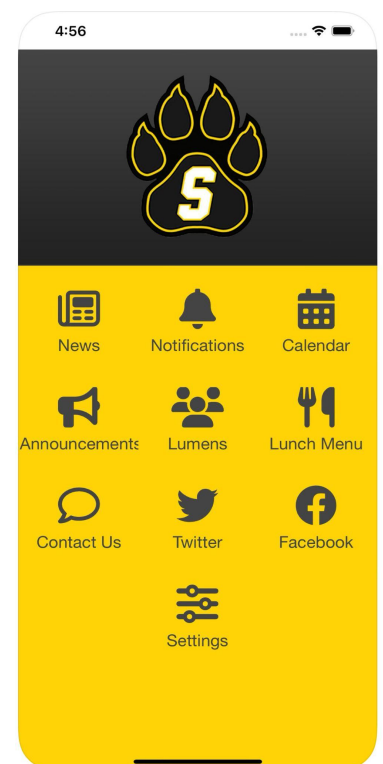

## Hunting Season

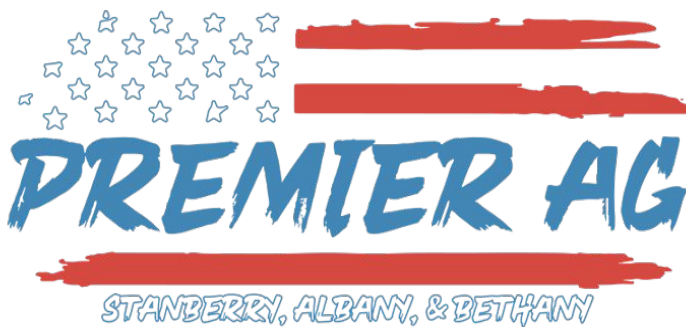

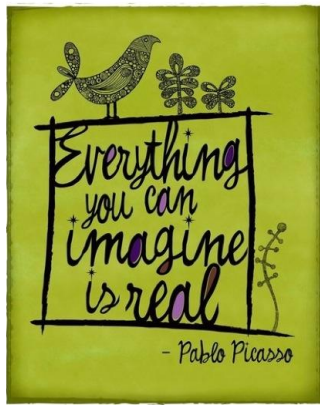
