



This year, members of the Stanberry FFA Chapter attended 2024 National Convention and Expo in Indianapolis, Indiana. These members included Morgon Showers, Cooper Adcock, Marli Hilton, Paige Woods, Brayden Dias, Hannah McQuinn, Dani Van Draska, and Mrs. Korinne Noble. The students loaded a charter bus at around 6:00 am on Tuesday, October 31st. They then picked up students from Worth County, Maysville, North Harrison, and Pattonsburg.

The group embarked on an eight-hour bus drive Indianapolis, with a few stops along the way. Their first stop was at Union Station in St. Louis, where students had meals, shopped, and explored the various attractions. They also had the opportunity to visit the St. Louis Arch, where students rode up in groups to the top and enjoyed beautiful views and the sway of the arch. 



Noah, an album by Noah Floersch, is a 40-minute collection of thoughts. "My Name," the intro, is an acoustic 4-minute piece about Noah and his confusion regarding whether the love he is feeling is real, serving as a personal identity reassurance. There are two overlapping parts that come together to convey the main idea of his self-uncertainty, even about his "true" name.

"Memoryology," the second track, narrates how he has forgotten his home, relying on what people have described to him about it. The title "Memoryology" derives from this concept. In the outro, he also reflects on this theme.

"Ghost of Chicago" is a piece where Noah repeatedly sees a woman, referring to her as a "ghost" or saying, "she's haunting me." This seems to suggest that in this album, Noah is disillusioned, perhaps experiencing symptoms of schizophrenia.

"Silver Lining" is a song in which Noah talks about his past as a "soldier" and compares his significant other to a shooting star, stating that she "bleeds out blue and white." It becomes clear that Noah was never a soldier; instead, he uses "soldier" as a metaphor to explain his "inner battles" he fights.

"I Will Always Find You" is a more upbeat song with a creepy undertone. He describes going to extreme lengths to find "you," asserting that he will "always find you, wherever they hide you." He also recounts how "you" asked, "How did we get here," and Noah dismisses "you" by

saying, "don't question it." Midway through the song, there is a groovy breakdown that offsets the ominous lyrics. Noah finishes the song by softly repeating, "There's no need to take part in what they made. When the world breaks, I will make it okay. Hide inside. Don't look outside... It feels like war." It is an eerie conclusion.

"Thompson's Station" mainly revolves around the idea of "running away with you 100 thousand times" and his determination to do anything to keep his "you". He refuses his "you's" plea to go home, as he believes that "home is where you go when you have nowhere left to go, and ahead, we have an open road."

"Little Crooked Creek" describes a creek beyond the visible trees, after which Noah's voice is abruptly cut off, as if something stops his "tape" from playing. So far in this album, there have been several references to kidnapping and mental health. In the song "Mississippi," Noah expresses how he feels alone now that his "you" has left him in some way. He blames himself, saving, "it's all my fault," and drives to

find "you", eventually discovering "you" in the middle of the interstate. He attempts to console her with "All my fault, Mississippi in your arms, kiss me, kill me." RON, another artist, joins him in a duet, playing the part of "you".

This song may serve as a prelude to "Mississippi."

"Woman," my personal favorite, depicts his "you" in a poetic nature, describing how she "cries like a cloud does," "speaks like the wind," and even "dances like branches that swing on a tree." He concludes by listing many reasons why he loves her and why he should.

"Cup" portrays how Noah doesn't want to burden others with his problems, as "everyone has their personal hells." He suggests, "give me your cup" so he can fill it, using "Cup" as a metaphor for love. He desires to fill his "you's" cup but doesn't want "you" to waste their time on his cup. He then expresses how he would give the world to "you" and give "you" everything.

"Open and Shut" is a song about his "you" crying, and he expresses reluctance to drive to "vou" because frequently changes their mind about their love. He employs "Open and Shut" to characterize his time with "you," stating that their love was "open and shut, that's what it was, you made up your mind, and I made up mine." He even questions, "Isn't this it's done?" implying uncertainty about whether his actions are normal or not within a relationship.

This questioning transitions back into the intro track, with Noah still questioning himself, not even knowing his own name. In an interview with Noah, I asked, "What is your favorite song out of the album?" He replied, "I don't like looking at the album like songs, they are just different chapters telling the same story."
