3rd Place Finish for Bulldogs

This year, the high school softball team competed in Springfield, Missouri at the 2024 MSHSAA State Softball tournament. After playing an amazing game against Princeton, winning 2-1, everyone on the team and in the community was very excited and proud of the girls for being the first softball team in Stanberry's history to make it to state. The week leading up to the trip, community members and business decorated their yards and windows, wishing the girls nothing but the best at state. Mrs. Maronde's leadership class, and Mrs. Hilton's stem class made posters and signs for the team as well.

On October 31st, the school held a pep assembly for the girls and coaches. The band played, the cheerleaders did chants, and community and school members came to show their support to the girls. Each girl was announced, and then Coach Brittney McClurg came and gave a short speech before the girls were sent out of the gym, through a tunnel of cheerleaders. As the girls were sent off by parents, friends, and family, they

were surprised by a charter bus they didn't know they were getting. They then traveled throughout the square as businesses came out and waved them goodbye.

The team's first stop was at Skyline High School (Coach McClurg's alma mater) to get a quick practice in. The school was very welcoming and kind, making signs for each of the girls and providing them with a drink and snack, wishing them the best of luck. The girls stopped at the fields to get their passes, and then went to dinner. Later on, they made it to the hotel and enjoyed ice cream brought by Dr. Davison. Many of the girls were too excited to sleep, and stayed up for a while before going to bed for the night.

Friday morning the team woke up, got dressed, and ate breakfast, arriving at the fields at 9:00am to get their picture taken. The team stretched and got prepared for the game to come at 11:00 am. The girls first played St. Elizabeth, and came out strong, scoring 2 points on them and keeping the lead. However, they fought back, and after a grand slam, St. Elizabeth took charge, winning 12-2.

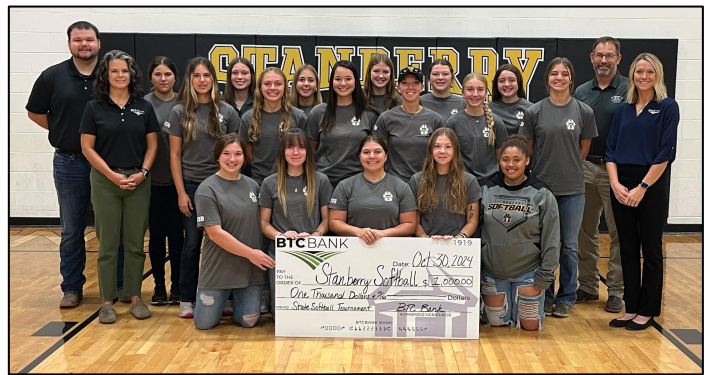
When asked how she was feeling after this game, Trista Lager stated, "The outcome kind of sucked but I took that as motivation into the next game to try and come out with a win."

Because they lost their first game, the girls went on to play Paris at 3:00 pm that same day. The girls forgot all about the last game and brought everything they had to the next one, wanting to end the season on a win and come home with a third place medal. The team was ready to go, they played strong defense against Paris, and brought their bats. Paris was the first to score, bringing the game 0-2 until the seventh inning where the girls were finally able to break through with Alyssa Wallace putting the first point on the board for the Bulldog's. Later Brea Jenson hit a ball into the outfield, bringing Marli Hilton into home for a close score, tying the game 2-2. The teams went into extra innings, with both of them battling for a win. Paris had bases loaded, but

Stanberry's defense stayed strong, getting a final out and coming in to hit. With Brookelynn Robinson at second, Alyssa Wallace hit a ball over the shortstops head and into the outfield, bringing Brookelynn home and securing the girls with a third place medal. The dugout and fans in the bleachers couldn't believe they had just won third place, making history as the first team at Stanberry to do it.

After the girls won third place, Mrs. McClurg commented, "I couldn't stop smiling! Watching the girls celebrating after they realized they won was a sight I will never forget. That kind of excitement is not easy to fake. At that moment I was so very proud of them, my assistant coach, and myself. For all of the adversity we battled throughout the year, we overcame it all! The girls set the bar high for Stanberry Softball!"

Congratulations to the team and for all of the hard work they put in throughout this season to make it one to remember.

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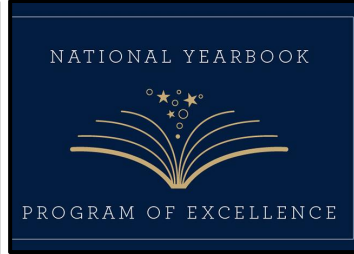

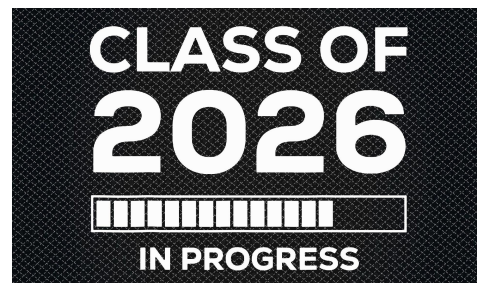

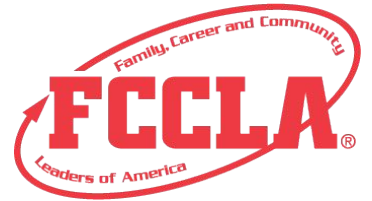
After all of the workshops had been completed it was time for awards to be handed out. A raffle was also held after the awards.

All in all, the Stanberry FCCLA chapter had an eventful day. They learned some new things and had fun doing it.




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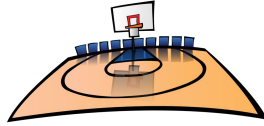
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Boys Basketball Kicks Off 2024 Season

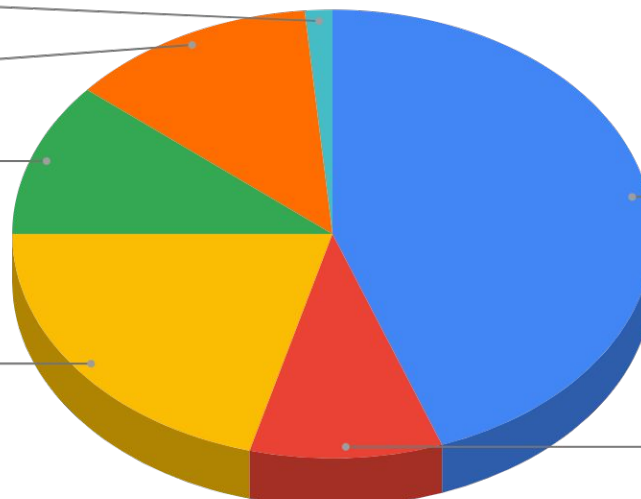
